
Learn about and celebrate Black History: Amanda Gorman

"I can hear change humming In its loudest, proudest song.

I don't fear change coming, And so I sing along."

Born in 1998, **Amanda Gorman** was the first National Youth Poet Laureate and the youngest presidential inaugural poet in U.S. history. She graduated from Harvard University in 2020 with a degree in sociology and has become a household name since President Biden's inauguration last year. For Amanda, poetry is activism and she uses her poems to address social justice issues including oppression, race, and feminism - and continues to inspire change.

- When she was 16 years old, Amanda founded One Pen One Page a nonprofit organization that teaches that poetry is a form of social justice and offers programming to underserved youth, providing them with a path to activism.
- Named the first Youth Poet Laureate of Los Angeles in 2014.
- Serves on the Board of 826 National, the largest youth writing network in the country with the goal of encouraging the exploration of endless possibility through the power of writing.
- Has published a few books, including *The Hill We Climb and Other Poems* and *Change Sings: A Children's Anthem*.

"If we merge mercy with might, and might with right, then love becomes our legacy and change our children's birthright So let us leave behind a country better than the one we were left with."
